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The Scapegoat Rene Girard

In *The Scapegoat*, Girard applies his approach to "texts of persecution," documents that recount phenomena of collective violence from the standpoint of the persecutor—documents such as the medieval poet Guillaume de Machaut's *Judgement of the King of Navarre*, which blames the Jews for the Black Death and describes their mass murder.

In myths, the scapegoat victim is divinized in retrospective recognition of his sacrifice. Victims are sacrificed – murdered, immolated, lynched. But this is transformed retrospectively in people's imaginations into self-sacrifice, with the victim supposedly renouncing the desire to continue living, for the sake of the community.

The phrase "scapegoat mechanism" was not coined by Girard himself; it had been used earlier by Kenneth Burke in *Permanence and Change* (1935) and *A Grammar of Motives* (1940).
